My Time with God - Week 24

As we conclude the gospel of John we need to pay attention to some key differences in how John tells the story of Jesus death and resurrection. The meaning of Jesus as the Good Shepherd, in 10:1-18, is revealed in Jesus' last days.

First, John frequently notes the Passover is coming. In 13:1 – when Jesus eats his last meal with the disciples it is *before the Passover meal*. In 18:28b – we hear Jesus is tried *before* the Passover. In 19:14 14 and 31 we are told Jesus dies on the day of Preparation for the Passover.

John is emphasizing that Jesus is sacrificed on the day of Preparation, in which the lambs are sacrificed for the Passover meal. John wants us to understand Jesus is the new Passover Lamb!

Jesus teaching on the Lord's Supper occurs in John 6:48-57, not at his last meal with the disciples.

Second, when John tells us about Jesus last act on the cross – “then he bowed his head and died” it is in fulfillment of John 10:14-18 – where Jesus says, “I choose to lay down my life.”

Finally, when Jesus talks to Peter after the resurrection, he tells Peter three times to “feed my sheep” as he calls Peter to be a faithful shepherd (see 10:2-15).

What does it mean to you, to think of Jesus as the lamb sacrificed for the new Passover, for the forgiveness of our sins?

What questions come to mind as you consider the two different time frames the gospel of John and the gospels of Matthew, Mark and Luke portray on when Jesus death occurred?

How do these different emphases impact your understanding of the Lord's Supper?

Presbyterian Disaster Assistance (PDA) is the emergency and refugee program of the Presbyterian Church U.S.A. The core budget, including staff and administrative costs, is funded through the One Great Hour of Sharing, and its program work is additionally funded through designated gifts.

Last year we received and dedicated **\$6429.18**. The 2010 goal of the Mission Committee is to duplicate this very generous gift.

The offering will be dedicated on Palm Sunday, March 28.

Pray for the people of Chile

On Saturday, February 27, 2010, an earthquake measuring 8.8 occurred off the coast of [Chile](#) in the Maule region approximately 115 kilometers north of the country's second largest city, Concepción. Early reports are that there were several hundred casualties. Our partner church in the region, the [Evangelical Presbyterian Church in Chile](#) reports no victims. The church in Talca has been destroyed. (Talca is located between Concepción and Santiago.) We currently have no PC(USA)-appointed mission personnel deployed in Chile. Presbyterian Disaster Assistance is monitoring events and is ready to work together with our partners as they assess the situation.
